

Tarras Community Response Group alters name

The recent meeting of the Tarras Community Response Group was very positive. The group identified the major challenge, as being the need to encourage the community on preparing for a major emergency. Providing an organised way to identify who needs help and who can offer it, ensuring that support reaches those who need it the most - this will remain a key focus for the group. Neighbourhood hubs are to be established throughout the Tarras area, with a coordinator from within that hub, making contact with each household.

These hubs will play a pivotal role in an emergency. Neighbours and community members often know who might need extra help, such as the elderly or those with special needs. The stronger the connections are within your community, the more resilient everyone will be in the face of emergencies. This will also be an important part of capturing information of resources and equipment that could potentially be used in an emergency.

Changing the name of the roup was discussed to bring us into line nationally with other groups and as suggested by Emergency Management Otago. The group decided the name should be, taking immediate effect: Tarras Emergency Resilience Group. The Facebook page has had the name changed and the email address is now:

tarraserg@gmail.com although a redirect from the original address has been temporarily put in place to ensure no emails are missed.

The meeting also wants to remind people to register on the "Get Ready" website. https://getready.govt.nz/ The meeting viewed Natural Hazards portal online & looked at local areas that could be affected by numerous natural hazards, including flooding, earthquakes, alluvial fans, liquefaction, and even tsunami. Tarras potentially impacted by any failure in the Hawea and/or Clyde dams as we could experience significant backwash. https://www.naturalhazardsportal.govt.nz/s/

COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT

Craig Mace has been a Volunteer firefighter for nearly 28 years, mostly in Queenstown area but the last 6 have been with Tarras.

No sirens for rural areas, so members are alerted by pager & amp; phone app AMS. (Availability Messaging System) AMS uses the device location to enable tracking Volunteers location when responding to an incident & amp; determining who is available. Many of the Volunteers work outside the area, but there is never less than 2-3 who turn out at each call.

Tarras Station has a fire truck & tanker, the tanker being sought after, so sometimes Tarras is called in to provide support to other units in the area. In the first 12 weeks of 2025, Tarras Volunteers have attended approx 16 callouts. These take a variety of forms – several grass fires/motor vehicle accidents. When there is a grass fire in the wider region eg: Wanaka/Hawea area, Tarras can be called to take over from the urban stations after the first hour, so that they can return to their home station to be prepared for the next call.

Volunteer Support Officers do a variety of roles for the FENZ Volunteers including, picking up used equipment for cleaning & amp; and repackaging ready for the next callout. The station carries several prepared packages of equipment & clothing so that there is minimal sorting to do once back at the station.

People sometime refer to FENZ now as Fire & Everything Else NZ, as their mandate formally includes accidents/emergencies, plus they can be called to provide support to Police and St John.

Generally, whoever drives the engine is also the pump operator and this is a role Craig enjoys. The Tarras Station being a rural station, the fire fighters, have no breathing apparatus or cutting equipment. Luggate Station carries the latter. Cromwell as an urban station is expected to have an engine out the door within 3 minutes, for Tarras it is 10mins.

After every callout the crew debrief together. What worked/what did not, & talking about any issues it raised for them as a crew, or as individuals. Professional counseling support is made available to them as needed after some call outs, group counseling is mandatory.



All crew are trained in CIMS (Critical Incident Management Systems). This system is NZs official framework to achieve effective coordinated incident management across responding agencies eg: Police, St John

Tarras Volunteers train every 2nd Tuesday for 2hrs. Depending on seasons, the training maybe outdoors practicing pumping water from the river or in winter it is more likely to be classroom training. Tarras unit currently has 13 members, age from 16yrs to approx. 70yrs & a mix of genders.

There is much more to know about the Tarras FENZ operations & Samp; their crews, but one thing I do know is that they save lives, & help people at critical moments in their lives & for that, & more, we remain grateful to them – their commitment & passion for community is to be acknowledged, valued & praised. Thanks team!
